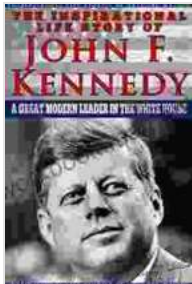

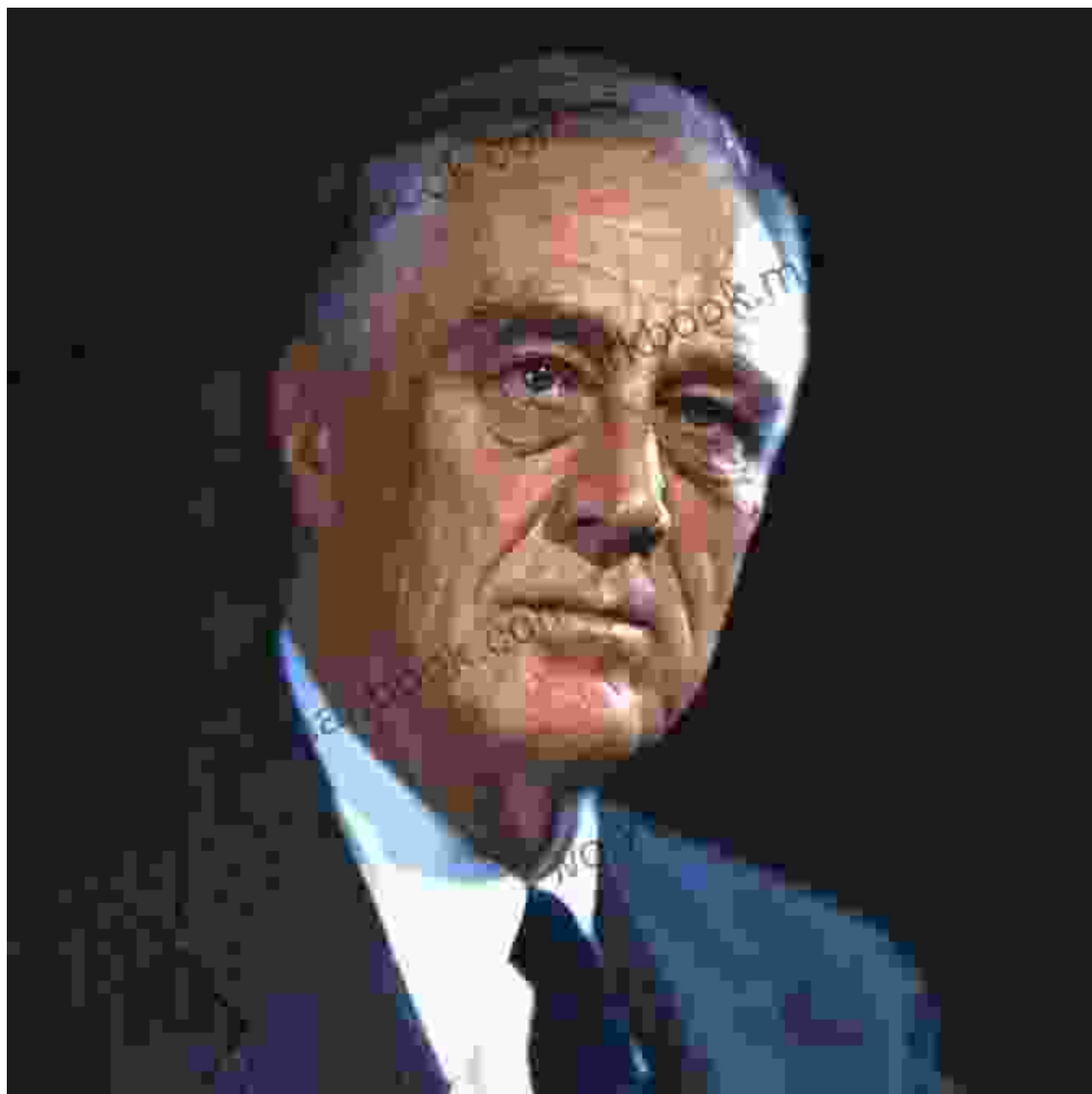

3. Ronald Reagan

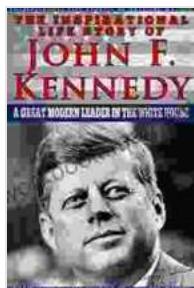


Ronald Reagan, the 40th President of the United States, is credited with ending the Cold War.

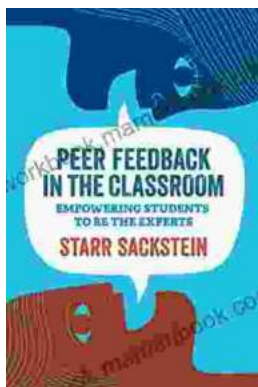
