
LGBT Educators Speak Out About What's Gotten Better and What Hasn't

The Progress That's Been Made


What Needs to Be Done


By taking these steps, we can create schools that are welcoming and inclusive for all students, regardless of their sexual orientation or gender identity.

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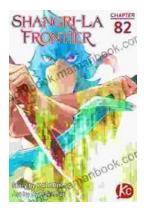
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
