


Recital Pieces for Clarinet from the Period of Impressionism: A Journey into Enchantment

Claude Debussy's Première Rhapsodie, composed in 1909, is widely regarded as one of the most significant works for clarinet in the Impressionist repertoire. Igor Stravinsky: Three Pieces for Clarinet Solo



Henri Rabaud: Solo de Concours



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
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
